We have developed this conference to facilitate self reflection, to urge re-examination of our research, analytic, and management approaches, and to create settings in which the extraordinary interdisciplinary power and might of the APPAM community can offer insights into, and innovative options for, addressing public policy problems. As such, we hope that the conference will serve as fertile ground upon which:


- We will find consistencies throughout our collective experiences that point to factors essential to successful policy making.
- We will break ground on what we in academia and in public policy practice need to do to advance worthy policy.
- We will have seeded the beginnings of rich networks through which we can continue to share innovations, ideas, successes and failures, as we strive to nurture the working relationship between the academic and public sectors.

Thank you for your support and special thanks to our colleagues who have devoted significant time and energy serving on the program committee.

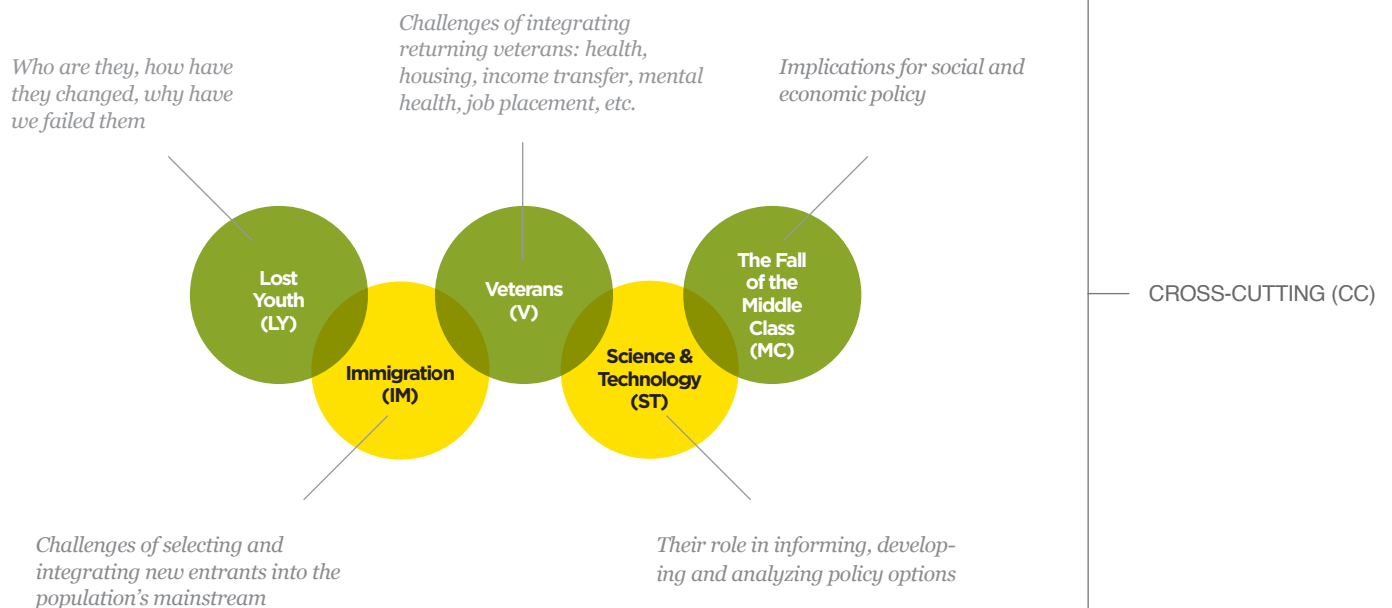


Conference Policy Areas

Past Fall Conferences have been structured around, and research assigned to, more than 20 discrete policy areas. For the 2013 Fall Conference, we have consolidated them into 10 broad policy issue areas. This restructuring is intended to better facilitate knowledge sharing among researchers and policy makers; to explore research that advances the Association goals of integration and policy relevance; and to broaden the context of research as we look to the future state of policy research and analysis. The 10 issue areas are listed below with their abbreviations and the policy area categories used in prior conferences.

Building upon the success of the 2012 conference, the 2013 conference offers cross-cutting sessions that focus on multi-dimensional aspects of broad public policy problems. Cross-cutting sessions are featured in the five categories to the right. Each cross-cutting session is designed to offer a diversity of perspectives, disciplines, methods, and analysis. Cross-cutting sessions are identified in this program with unique color coding.

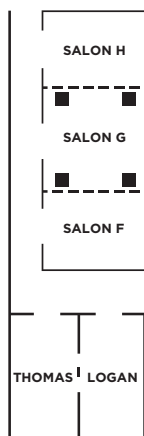

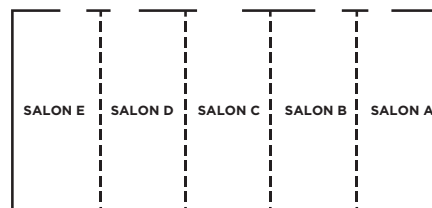

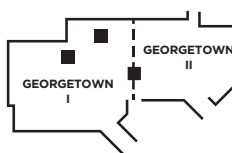
SECOND FLOOR (WEST END BALLROOM)



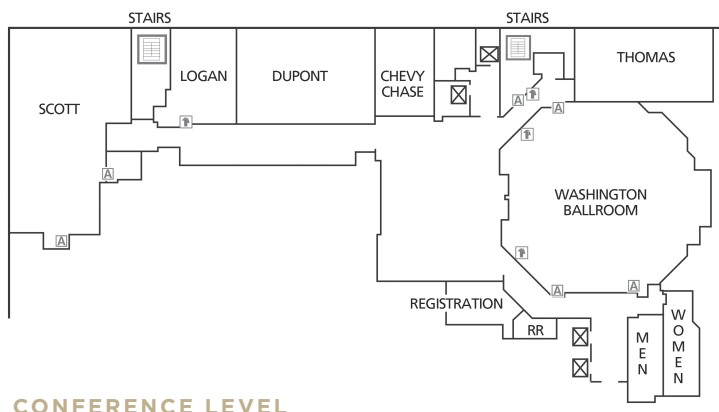
